

One of Georgia's nonprofit gems is joining the Walton Gas Champions for Charities lineup this season.

Annandale Village is one of three organizations vying for Walton Gas customers' votes. Also competing are perennial favorites Camp Twin Lakes and Children's Hospital of Atlanta.

The newcomer is one of only three nonprofit residential communities in the entire United States, and the only one in the Southeast, serving adults with developmental disabilities and acquired brain injuries at all stages of life and care. It offers a full continuum – from independent living to assisted living to skilled nursing.

"When our residents come here, our hope is this becomes their home and their community for the rest of their lives," said Kayce Pearce, the organization's chief development and marketing officer.

Annandale Village, which occupies 55 wooded acres in Suwanee, currently serves 220 individuals. Most live on campus in their own apartments.

"We want every resident to live as independently as possible," Pearce said. This includes experiencing a healthy balance of recreational, social and wellness enrichment.

When they're not working a paid job or volunteering in the community, residents can enjoy amenities such as an indoor pool, gym, fitness center, computer lab, art and music activities and amusement arcade. The campus also features a health services clinic and a state-of-the-art dining hall.

Pearce says Walton Gas customers should consider voting for Annandale Village because "this is where happiness lives."

After a pandemic-related lull, the housing market is again booming in Northeast Georgia.

That's good news for the local economy, says Ruth Ann Miller. She is the executive officer for the Athens Area Home Builders Association (AAHBA), a professional trade group that tracks new construction and remodeling trends in nine counties in Northeast Georgia.

"As the housing industry grows, so grows the rest of the economy," she said. AAHBA monitors trends in a nine-county area northeast of metro Atlanta.



"This has been a fast-growing area of the state for years, but with recent announcements by big manufacturers like electric vehicle maker Rivian Automotive, we've moved from steady to explosive," she added, pointing to year-over-year gains in residential construction permits.

Home building in Northeast Georgia mirrors national statistics. Single-family housing starts in the U.S. hit an 11-month high in May, despite elevated interest rates and higher price tags. Demand that exceeds existing home inventory and improving supply chains are behind the trend, reports the National Association of Home Builders.

Spencer Frye, president of AAHBA, doesn't see the local

boom going bust anytime soon.

"As single-family housing has become a Wall Street commodity and hedge funds continue to pour money into rental acquisitions, the demand to achieve the American dream of

homeownership will continue to rise as Georgia's population increases," he said.

That comes as no surprise to those who have watched the largely rural area transform into new subdivisions and commercial districts.

Mexican Chicken Casserole

INGREDIENTS

1 can cream of chicken soup

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 large can of mushrooms

1 pint sour cream

1 medium onion, grated

1 can green chili salsa, drained

1 can green chopped chilis

2-3 chopped jalapenos, optional

2 cups shredded sharp cheddar

6 large flour tortillas, torn into pieces

4 chicken breasts, boneless and skinless



INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Boil chicken breasts until well done and tender; season with salt and pepper. Cut into chunks and set aside. Combine soups, onions, mushrooms and sour cream, add salsa and chilies. Stir in cut-up chicken. In large casserole dish, put one-half the mixture, cover with torn tortillas, and sprinkle with cheese. Repeat this layering process ending in cheese. Top with jalapenos or hot salsa for extra spice. Bake uncovered for 1 hour.
