



Springtime Safety

FROM SHOVELING TO STORMS, DO YOUR PART TO PROTECT THE PIPELINE

Spring has arrived in Georgia, prompting homeowners to tackle outdoor projects. It's also the season to be on guard for severe storms. Whatever spring brings, Walton Gas and Atlanta Gas Light share these rules for avoiding and identifying dangerous gas leaks.

#1 Dial before you dig

If your outdoor project involves digging, Georgia law requires you to **dial 811** or **visit Georgia 811** at least three days in advance to have underground utility lines marked. The service is free. Locators will mark the approximate location of buried lines with color-coded paint, flags or stakes corresponding to the utility. The color used for natural gas is yellow.



#2 Plant with care

Tree roots growing around a gas line can damage it, allowing the escape of gas. When installing new landscaping, consider the tree's mature size and plant it where it won't interfere with underground lines. Call 811 to locate all underground utilities before digging or pulling out shrubs or trees.

#3 Mind the meter

Maintain a 2-foot distance when using power tools to trim grass and weeds around the gas meter. Any mulch or other landscape material should allow for 6 inches between the bottom of your meter and the ground.

#4 Use your senses

Stay alert for gas leaks while working outside. If you smell a "rotten egg" odor, see dead vegetation or discolored soil near a pipeline, or hear hissing or a high-pitched whistle, a leak is indicated.

#5 Be storm savvy

March-April-May is tornado season in Georgia. Atlanta Gas Light advises against shutting off the valves to natural gas meters when a major storm is predicted. After a storm, look for uprooted trees or fallen structures that can harm gas lines. Check natural gas appliances for damage. If flooding occurs, don't operate any gas-powered appliances that may have been under water.

If a natural gas line is damaged accidentally or the distinctive rotten egg odor is detected, vacate all people and pets immediately. **Call 911 or the Atlanta Gas Light 24-hour emergency phone line at 877-427-4321 for help.**

Beef Stroganoff

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 tablespoon garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon onions, minced
- 1 small can sliced mushrooms, optional
- 2 1/2 pounds beef, cubed
- Seasoning mixture of basil, chives, parsley, oregano, nutmeg, cumin and smoked paprika
- 1/2 cup red wine
- 1 medium can crushed tomatoes
- 1 small can tomato paste
- 2 cans Media Crema
- Salt and pepper
- Half-and-half, optional

INSTRUCTIONS

In a large pot golden the garlic and onion, but don't let it brown. Add beef, seasoning mixture, wine and a splash of water and let simmer until meat changes color. Add the crushed tomatoes and tomato paste, mix well. Let simmer until water evaporates to half the meat level, stirring occasionally. Add Media Crema and salt and pepper to taste. Do not let the mixture boil. Add a splash of half-and-half if cream is too thick. This dish is traditionally served with string chips and rice.
